Dancing Classrooms from a Teaching Artist's Perspective

What will always pull at my heartstrings, that always chokes me up a little, is when the shy ones, the ones that have struggled, or the ones that are seen as outcasts, raise their hands to demonstrate in the middle of our circle. As a former shy violet myself, those moments hang with me. Last spring, a student who was ostracized, who was very clearly feeling vulnerable about having to dance with his peers, was trying desperately to get out of participating in the program. His parents were concerned that he was going to face further bullying. I asked the student to give me three weeks. If at that point he still hated it, we could reassess. Three weeks passed. Four weeks passed. There was never a need to reassess. As time went on, small changes could be seen from this particular student. He was raising

his hand to demonstrate, he was talking more to his classmates. By the day of their culmination, several of his classmates were so excited for him. Lo and behold, there he was. In a nice blazer with

his blonde locks pulled up, smiling ear to ear. This was not the same kid from ten weeks ago.

Program Highlights 2022/2023

The 2022/2023 academic year saw the return of the Dancing Classrooms St. Louis program as it is intended—face to face, arm in arm, and hand to hand! Dance Frame was back and, so too, were our community and competition events. The 2022/2023 program year included three Qualifying Event competitions, an elevated Colors of the Rainbow Team Match Championship, and a successful DCSTL Summer Ballroom Dance Camp.

The 2022/2023 Qualifying Event Competitions were hosted by St. Gabriel the Archangel School, St. Stephen Protomartyr School, and South City Catholic Academy. Each Qualifying Event yielded two "Gold Level" winning schools. Six schools received the opportunity to move on to the coveted 2022/2023 Colors of the Rainbow Team Match Championship.



"Saint Gabriel the Archangel was so excited to be able to participate in Dancing Classrooms' in-person events this past year. Program Outreach

A PROGRAM FOR ALL

We are an organization that celebrates diversity and is committed to being equitable and inclusive in our practices. It is of utmost importance to DCSTL that students from every facet of our community be given the opportunity to experience the joys and success that accompany participation in a Dancing Classrooms residency. To ensure that our program reaches as many young people across our community as possible, DCSTL works hard to remove all barriers to participation.

In a DCSTL residency, all students are welcome. Program adaptations are made to accomodate students with religious mandates and/or physical and/or cognitive limitations. Additionally, our curriculum has

removed all gender-identifying labels and does not separate children based upon perceived gender. Children in our program learn and perform ballroom dance in a variety of roles, not limited to the traditional male/female pairing.





Since 2017, DCSTL has been committed to raising a minimum of \$30,000 annually to fund its program for some 10+ classrooms in under-resourced schools.

Each year, DCSTL fundraises specifically to support its School Scholarship Fund. Through the School Scholarship Fund, underresourced schools situated in low-income areas can receive full or partial funding support toward the cost of programming. In FY 23, 9 participating schools (totaling 17 residencies) received the DCSTL program for free or at reduced cost, resulting in 300+ students gaining access to our program.

COSTUME CLOSET

In addition to subsidizing program costs for nearly half of our school partners, DCSTL supplies performance attire for students in need through its Costume Closet. Supported through in-kind and monetary donations, the DCSTL Costume Closet provides clothing, shoes, belts, and accessories to participating students free of charge. Every child deserves to look and feel their best when performing before an audience! Students utilizing the Costume Closet have the option to keep all items or return them for future use. **During the 2022/2023 academic year, DCSTL provided some 50 students with performance wear.**



DCSTL closed out 2022 doing what it does best...DANCING! Over 40 guests attended our 'Rock The Night Away' event hosted at the beautiful Majestic Dance Studio. Additional support went toward covering the costs of the 2023 Colors of the Rainbow Team Match Championship at the Touhill Performing Arts Center, and replenishing the DCSTL Costume Closet that provides clothing, shoes, and accessories for students in need of performance attire. To all that volunteered, lent a hand, shook a tail feather, and donated—we are so grateful! DCSTL SUMMER BALLROOM DANCE CAMP 2023

Programming for 2022/2023 was in full swing, including the return of DCSTL's Summer Ballroom Dance Camp. Held June 26-30th at Majestic Dance Studio and open to ALL dancers ages 9-12, campers spent the week dancing together, creating connections, and making memories! Facilitated by DCSTL Teaching Artists, participants learned two choreographed routines (Swing & Cha Cha) and polished their moves from the DCSTL Residency repertoire. In addition to dancing, each day centered on a character-building theme and included team building exercises, games, conversations, and reflections.





One of our favorite moments from the week came when camp participants performed for residents at The Grande at Creve Coeur Assisted Living and Memory Care Facility. It was a sheer delight to witness the residents tapping their toes, dancing in their seats, and with smiles aglow as they took in the performance. Many thanks to all of the parents that helped to make our camp field trip and performance happen through coordinating carpools and providing transportation.

On the last day of camp, friends and family members were treated to a VIP performance and even got to join in on the dancing! Special thanks to DCSTL Teaching Artists, Joyce, Carrie, and Lawrence who served up cool choreography and kept the fun-factor high. To the campers that attended, we wish to commend you for your kindness, cooperation, enthusiasm and positivity—camp was an awesome experience because of YOU!





Program Impact

We asked the Teachers and Principals that we partnered with during the 2022/2023 academic year to tell us how we did. Surveys measuring changes in students' attitudes, relationship skills, knowledge, physical coordination/agility, cultural knowledge/awareness and general enjoyment were distributed to all school partners. Results from these surveys demonstrate the profound positive impact that the DCSTL Core Residency Program has on students.

Of the teachers and principals surveyed from the 2022/2023 academic year:

- 93% Agreed/Strongly Agreed that the DCSTL program improved students' cooperation and teamwork skills.
- 92% Agreed/Strongly Agreed that the DCSTL program improved students' ability to recognize musical time changes and rhythms.
- 77% Agreed/Strongly Agreed that the DCSTL program helped students' to overcome anxieties.
- 77% Agreed/Strongly Agreed that the DCSTL program improved students' etiquette and social skills.
- 77% Agreed/Strongly Agreed that the DCSTL program increased students' physical coordination, bodily awareness, and agility.
- 69% Agreed/Strongly Agreed that the DCSTL program increased students' confidence and self esteem.
- 61% Agreed/Strongly Agreed that the DCSTL program increased students' cultural awareness.
- Our favorite finding, **92%** of our school partners reported that their **students' liked the DCSTL program a lot!**





"I think they learned that trust goes both ways. In order to feel comfortable with your partner, you need to know they will respect you. On the other side, your partner is also looking for respect from you. The students found that, when conflict was high among their peers, dancing was not fun. Resolving conflict, showing mutual respect, and trust-building were all essential parts of our dancing experience. Because the teamwork in Dancing Classrooms is student-directed, the skills have translated into the classroom with students being more comfortable taking suggestions from their peers. It has allowed me as the teacher to trust the students to self-regulate better, and to remind their peers of correct procedures or behaviors."

As the sessions progressed, these students did begin to work through some of their struggles. It was hard at times, however, they all participated well and showed progress. Shortly after the culminating event and competition, students participated in camp - they worked together in this setting better than we expected, and several students were more respectful and cooperative for the last few months."




